Already at the opening of the novel a reason for

Celie's writing is given.: You better not tell anybody

but God. It'd kill your mammy.¹ Celie takes this

warning literally. She is frightened of her father and therefore obeys. Another motivation for Celie's writing we get to know from one of Nettie's letters to Celie: ...I remember one time you said your life made you feel so ashamed you couldn't even talk about it to God, you had to write it, bad as you thought your writing was. Well, now I know what you meant.² Celie feels guilty and ashamed, because of the alleged incest with her father. She is not allowed to tell anybody (certainly not her mother) but needs to articulate herself somehow to enable herself to cope with her situation. So Celie starts to write her letters to God, when at the age of 14 years her record of sorrow and pain begins. Celie loses her mother and later on also Nettie, her sister. Crockett Johnson (born David Johnson Leisk, 1906 – 1975) and Ruth Krauss (1901 – 1993) were a husband-and-wife team that created such popular

children's books as *The Carrot Seed* and *How to Make an Earthquake*. Separately, Johnson created the enduring children's classic *Harold and the Purple Crayon* and the groundbreaking comic strip *Barnaby*. Krauss wrote over a dozen children's books illustrated by others, and pioneered the use of spontaneous, loose-tongued kids in children's literature.
